

Blocks shown in Brush Strokes and Banyan Classics Brush Strokes - 81230-63 | Banyan Classics - 81205-10








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- Make the same block twice

- Unfinished block size is 9 1/2"




Block 22a.




Block 22b.

2 contrasting fabrics—1/8 yard each Label your fabrics #1 & #2 (It doesn't matter which way you label them) From each of the fabrics cut: (see cutting diagram below) Cut (4) 3 7/8" squares Cut (1) 3 ¹/₂" square Cut remaining fabric into (2) 2" strips From the (2) 2" strips of each of the fabrics cut: Cut (2) 2" squares – for a total of (4) 2" squares of each fabric



Block 22a. Take one remaining 2" strip from fabric #1 and one remaining 2" strip from fabric #2. Sew strips together and sub cut into $3\frac{1}{2}$ " sections yielding four squares. (See diagram below).




Take (1) 3 7/8" square from fabric #1 and (1) 3 7/8" square from fabric #2. Place one square of each fabric right sides together and draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of one of the squares. Pin. Stitch a scant 1/4" away from both sides of the drawn line. Cut apart on the drawn line and you have two sewn half square triangle units! Repeat this process to yield a total of four sewn half square triangle units. See diagram below.



Take (1) 3 ½" square from fabric #1 and the (4) 2" squares from fabric #2. Place one of the 2" squares right sides together onto the bottom right corner of the 3 ½" square. Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner as shown. Sew along drawn line.

Cut off excess fabric 1/4" above seam line. Press the stitched block open.

Repeat this process with the remaining (3) 2" squares on the other three corners so that you have a pieced unit as shown below.



Arrange all the units as shown in Block 22a. diagram above and sew together.

Block 22b. Take the remaining 2" strip from fabric #1 and the remaining 2" strip from fabric #2. Sew strips together and sub cut into 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " sections yielding four squares. See diagram above.

Take (1) 3 7/8" square from fabric #2 and (1) 3 7/8" square from fabric #1. Place one square of each fabric right sides together and draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of one of the squares. Pin. Stitch a scant 1/4" away from both sides of the drawn line. Cut apart on the drawn line and you have two sewn half square triangle units! Repeat this process to yield a total of four sewn half square triangle units. See diagram above.

Take (1) 3 ½" square from fabric #2 and the (4) 2" squares from fabric #1. Place one of the 2" squares right sides together onto the bottom right corner of the 3 ½" square. Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner as shown. Sew along drawn line. Cut off excess fabric ¼" inch above seam line. Press the stitched block open. Repeat this process with the remaining (3) 2" squares on the other three corners so that you have a pieced unit as shown below. Arrange all the units as shown in Block 22b. diagram above and sew together.
